



AQUARIUS


Key to Templates:

- 4) Water pot
- 5) Aquarius symbol
- 6) Water



INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAKING YOUR COSTUME:

- 1) Print out the two previous pages of this pdf on standard A4 paper and cut out the shapes that are numbered in the template key.
- 2) Use the paper shapes as templates to cut out the same shapes from pieces of coloured card. The colour you choose for the mask and the aquarius zodiac symbol are entirely up to you — but use blue for the water (6) and perhaps a brown, grey or terracotta colour for the pot (4), to suggest earthenware.
- 3) Stick the pot shape onto the mask, so they line up together at the top (see **Fig. 1**, below, for guidance).
- 4) Use a sharp knife or scissors to make small slits on the card water oval (6), in the positions indicated on the template — then thread long pieces of blue ribbon (fabric, or plastic parcel ribbon) through the slits and tape the ends to the back of the oval (see **Fig. 2**, below).
- 5) Stick the blue water oval (6) to the pot/mask, in the position indicated in Fig. 3, and arrange the ribbons to one side, so they look like ‘water’ flowing out of the pot.
- 6) Use a hole-punch or knife to make the holes for elastic (3) on each side of the mask, and thread with elastic (**Fig. 3**)
- 7) Stick the aquarius symbol (5) to the mask, so it sits centrally on the front of the pot (see **Fig. 1**)
- 8) Finish off your costume by wrapping up warm in comfy, waterproof clothes — then make yourself an over costume, by draping either a scarf, shawl, or large piece of fabric over your shoulders, in a colour that matches your mask (preferably a bright, or metallic colour, to make a more theatrical impact) (**Fig. 4**)
- 9) You can make your costume even more theatrical by sticking/sewing coloured fabric ribbons to your over-costume — or add feathers, tinsel, sequins... whatever you want to customise your zodiac sign!
